This house was likely built circa 1886 by local contractor and mayor of Sandgate William John Farmer Cooksley, who obtained the site in 1885. Cooksley, a skilled carpenter, had arrived in the Moreton Bay district in 1858. Although almost penniless, he went on to become one of Queensland's most successful pioneers. He built some of Sandgate's earliest buildings and was its second mayor. Cooksley died in 1892 and the house was held by his trustees until it was sold in 1909. Later named 'lona', the house was a rental property and seaside home for its twentieth century owners.

## Statement of significance

#### Relevant assessment criteria

This is a place of local heritage significance and meets one or more of the local heritage criteria under the Heritage planning scheme policy of the *Brisbane City Plan 2014*. It is significant because:

#### **Historical**

**CRITERION A** 

The place is important in demonstrating the evolution or pattern of the city's or local area's history

as it demonstrates the residential growth of Sandgate.

#### **Aesthetic**

**CRITERION E** 

The place is important because of its aesthetic significance

as a lowset nineteenth century timber house with decorative elements including lacework to the verandah.

#### Historical association

**CRITERION H** 

The place has a special association with the life or work of a particular person, group or organization of importance in the city's or local area's history

for its connection with prominent local builder and mayor William John Farmer Cooksley.
