This late nineteenth century house is one of three identical houses built adjacent to each other following the transfer of the property from Paul Cole Atkinson to Mary Ann Willcocks, wife of George Charles Willcocks in 1890. Willcocks, a successful railway contractor, probably built these houses as rental investment properties to attract middle class tenants, exemplifying Brisbane's late nineteenth century speculative housing development. He also built four identical houses in Moreton Street in 1895 as rental investment properties. In 1892 the house was listed as 'Wanya' and then 'Way Back' by 1908. It was renamed 'Clydesdale' by the 1920s following the transfer of the property from Mary Ann Willcocks to William Kirk, an inspector, in 1919. This single-storey masonry house was built in the Victorian Filigree style. It has a pyramid, corrugated-iron roof with detached, bull-nose verandah, decorative timber pediment over the front entrance and cast-iron balustrades.

Statement of significance

Relevant assessment criteria

This is a place of local heritage significance and meets one or more of the local heritage criteria under the Heritage planning scheme policy of the *Brisbane City Plan 2014*. It is significant because:

Historical

CRITERION A

The place is important in demonstrating the evolution or pattern of the city's or local area's history

as it illustrates the pattern of residential development in the late nineteenth century on Merthyr Road, the main east-west artery across the New Farm peninsular.

Aesthetic

CRITERION E

The place is important because of its aesthetic significance

as one of three identical, symmetrical, 1890s masonry houses which form a highly-cohesive visual group.
