'Caversham' was built in 1882 for the Under Colonial Secretary, Robert John Gray. The house was constructed on a large block of land in the earliest settled part of the Sandgate-Shorncliffe area. In 1885 Gray sold the property to pastoralist Herbert Hunter, who used the property as a holiday residence. In the twentieth century the house attracted a variety of owners, including a spinster, a magistrate and his family, and a member of the Literature Board of Review. This substantial residence demonstrates the growing popularity of the Sandgate-Shorncliffe area in the late nineteenth century.

## **Statement of significance**

#### **Relevant assessment criteria**

This is a place of local heritage significance and meets one or more of the local heritage criteria under the Heritage planning scheme policy of the *Brisbane City Plan 2014*. It is significant because:

#### Historical

**CRITERION A** 

The place is important in demonstrating the evolution or pattern of the city's or local area's history

as it reflects the growth of Shorncliffe as a desirable seaside suburb.

#### Aesthetic

**CRITERION E** 

The place is important because of its aesthetic significance

as a substantial residence with features including wide verandahs with original cross-bracing and a prominent portico, and moulded decorative top chimneys.

#### **Historical association**

**CRITERION H** 

The place has a special association with the life or work of a particular person, group or organization of importance in the city's or local area's history

as a residence built for Robert John Grey, Under Colonial Secretary and later Railways Commissioner.
