Within the site known today as Gallipoli Barracks, are several historically significant structures – the magazine complex, All Saints Chapel and small arms store. The land on which the Enoggera Army Camp, as it was first known, was established, was acquired by the Commonwealth Government in 1908 for the training and accommodation of troops in its attempt to form a national defence force. The significant structures remaining on the site were constructed between 1910 and 1916. The Gallipoli Barracks are significant as the training ground for thousands of Queenslanders who served in wars throughout the twentieth century.

Statement of significance

Relevant assessment criteria

This is a place of local heritage significance and meets one or more of the local heritage criteria under the Heritage planning scheme policy of the *Brisbane City Plan 2014*.

It is significant because:

Historical

CRITERION A

The place is important in demonstrating the evolution or pattern of the city's or local area's history as the training ground for thousands of Queensland troops who served their country in the field of war.

Rarity

CRITERION B

The place demonstrates rare, uncommon or endangered aspects of the city's or local area's cultural heritage as a complex of early twentieth-century magazine structures designed for the safe storage of explosives.

Representative

CRITERION D

The place is important in demonstrating the principal characteristics of a particular class or classes of cultural places

as a complex of early twentieth-century military magazines designed to house explosives.

Social

CRITERION G

The place has a strong or special association with the life or work of a particular community or cultural group for social, cultural or spiritual reasons

as the training ground for thousands of Queensland troops who served their country in many overseas conflicts.
