This timber hall was built circa 1926 as the Sunnybank School of Arts, twelve years after the Sunnybank Farmers' and Progress Association requested that an acre of the existing recreation reserve be set aside for a School of Arts. Funds raised by the Progress Association financed the construction of the hall. In 1945, control of the building was taken over by the Brisbane City Council. The hall has been used by many community groups including the Sunnybank Progress Association, Sunnybank Repertory Theatre Company, the CWA and has served as a theatre, dance studio, local library and child care service.

Statement of significance

Relevant assessment criteria

This is a place of local heritage significance and meets one or more of the local heritage criteria under the Heritage planning scheme policy of the *Brisbane City Plan 2014*. It is significant because:

Historical

CRITERION A

The place is important in demonstrating the evolution or pattern of the city's or local area's history

as a hall erected by and for the local community in the 1920s when Sunnybank was predominantly a farming district.

Rarity

CRITERION B

The place demonstrates rare, uncommon or endangered aspects of the city's or local area's cultural heritage as a modest timber building surviving in continuous community use as a community hall.

Social

CRITERION G

The place has a strong or special association with the life or work of a particular community or cultural group for social, cultural or spiritual reasons

as a hall which has accommodated a range of community gatherings important to the local community since the 1920s.

Historical association

CRITERION H

The place has a special association with the life or work of a particular person, group or organization of importance in the city's or local area's history

as a hall commissioned by the School of Arts movement.
